


The Spirit of Ancient Hindu Culture

The survey is necessarily suggestive, not exhaustive. No apology is needed, we believe, as regards an attempt at the presentation of the point of view of the ancient Hindus in mental and moral sciences. The whole civilization of ancient India may be summed up in the one word: Adwaita. We have, therefore, tried to understand the implications of this creed. The first chapter is meant to express the contrast between the East and the West. The second chapter was the University Prize Essay of 1913. The third chapter was a contribution to the Indian Sociological Journal. In the fourth chapter, we have tried to do justice to the virile elements of our political thought. The fifth chapter is mainly negative, showing more what Hindu Theology is not than what it is. The sixth and seventh chapters contain a brief exposition and an appreciation of the Adwaita Vada. We humbly crave the indulgence of our readers for some slips here and there in the book, which were not quite easily avoidable as the book was to be hurried through the press within a month.

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
